



Policy for the Admission Arrangement of Pupils to Studley Green Primary School for the Admissions Year 2024-25

This policy applies to Studley Green Primary School, which is a Foundation School. The Governors, as the Admissions Authority, are responsible for determining admissions policy and procedures. This policy has been written in accordance with the Admissions Code from the Department for Education, Feb 2012, and in accordance with advice from Wiltshire Council.

The total number of children admitted to the school shall be in accordance with the Published Admission Number (PAN). This defines the number of places available for each year group in the school. All applications will be agreed until the PAN has been reached and if in keeping with the agreed statements in this policy. The PAN for the school for admission from September 2024 is 30. This is the same as the previous year.

In keeping with our school ethos of openness and honesty, the admissions authority for Studley Green Primary School wish to make it very clear that they will admit pupils to their school in the full confidence of having the capacity to meet that child's individual needs.

We would urge prospective parents to visit our school website to gather a clear overview of what our school can offer for their child.

With the above ethos in mind, the admissions authority for Studley Green Primary School wish to make reference to section 86 of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998 which states that 'the admission authority **must** comply with any preference expressed by a parent except where to do so would prejudice the provision of efficient education or the efficient use of resources.'

Fair Access Protocol

All Wiltshire Schools will act in accordance with the Fair Access Protocol which has been adopted to give access to educational provisions for hard to place children.

If the governing body of any school refuse admission to a child with challenging behaviour (outside the normal intake round) the case must be referred to the LA for consideration under the In-Year Fair Access Protocol. This will normally only be the case where the school has a partially high proportion of children with challenging behaviour or previously excluded children.

This protocol does not apply to a Child in Care (Looked after Child, a previously looked after child) or a child with an Education, Health Care Plan, as these children must be admitted.

Children entering school in September at the age of 4 years

Parents have a right to ask for their child to begin school full time from the first day of term. At Studley Green we will, in every case, recommend a phased start to school. Our induction process

for Reception children can be read in our Induction Policy and is made known to all parents considering a place at our school for their child.

The deadline for Reception admissions in 2024 will be January 15th 2024.

In-year applications to transfer to Studley Green

If parents wish to transfer their child to Studley Green mid-year, they are advised to contact the school to arrange an initial visit of interest. If they wish to make an application, they should contact the admissions department at the local authority who manage all in-year applications. The Governing Body of Studley Green School has an admissions panel who meet approximately every 4 weeks if required to consider in-year applications received from the local authority. It is

always advised that, except in emergency situations, children will transfer at the beginning of the next term.

In the interest of safeguarding children, all in-year applications for admission to all year groups, are co-ordinated by the Local Authority.

<u>Waiting lists</u>

The Governing Body for Studley Green School maintains a clear, fair and objective waiting list for the first term of the academic year of admission. Each added child will require the list to be ranked again in line with the published oversubscription criteria. Priority will not be given to children based on the date their application was received or their name was added to the list. Looked after children, previously looked after children, and those allocated a place at the school in accordance with a Fair Access Protocol, will take precedence over those on a waiting list.

Early, deferred or delayed admission:

Early admission

Admissions earlier than the term following the child's 4th birthday may be agreed in exceptional circumstances, such as medical or social factors that have an adverse effect on the child. The request must have the approval of the admission authority's professional advisers and there must be no suitable alternative pre-school provision available.

All cases will be considered and terms agreed, individually, with no precedent set for future applications.

Deferred admission until later in the academic year

A school place in the reception class is available for children from the September of the academic year in which they are four. Where an offer of a place is made to a child below compulsory school age, parents have the right to defer their child's entry to school until later in the school year. The place is held for the child and is not available to be offered to another child. Entry may not be deferred beyond the beginning of the term after the child's fifth birthday, nor beyond the academic year for which the admission is sought.

Where a parent or guardian chooses to defer their child's admission beyond the academic year for which admission is sought, the place originally offered cannot be held over and a fresh application is required. Children whose entry is deferred are expected to join their chronological peer group, i.e. year 1.

Exceptional circumstances requiring delayed admissions

In exceptional circumstances children may be considered for delayed school entry into reception class, i.e. out of their chronological year group. A written request must be made by the parents to the LA. All such requests will be considered by the admission authority's professional advisors on a case by case basis, in discussion with parents and the preferred school.

Appeals Process

If a parent has not been successful in gaining a place at Studley Green Primary School, they have a right to appeal.

Parents should submit their appeal in writing to the Chair of Governors at the school address which can be found on the school's website.

Oversubscription Criteria

Where the school is over-subscribed places are allocated to children in order of the ranked criteria listed below:

1. Looked After Children / Previously Looked After children

A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked

after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship order including those who appear [to the admission authority] to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in

the

exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).

2. Designated Area Siblings and Shared Area Siblings

A child is considered under this criterion if an older sibling is attending the school as at the deadline date, excluding pupils in year 6, and where the child lives within the designated area or shared area at the same address as the older sibling. Step, half and foster siblings are also included in this category;

3. Other Children from the Designated Area or Shared Area

Children resident within the designated area or shared area who do not qualify under one of the criteria above;

4. Other Siblings

A child is considered under this criterion if an older sibling is attending the school as at the deadline date, excluding pupils in year 6, and where the child lives at the same address as the older sibling. Step, half and foster siblings are also included in this category;

The definition of 'sibling' is: a brother or sister, half brother or sister, adopted brother or sister, step brother or sister, or the child of the parent/carer's partner, and in every case, who is living at the same family unit at the same address.

5. Other children

Children to whom none of the above criteria apply.

If the school is oversubscribed within any of the above categories above, the straight-line distance from the child's home address to the school will be used as the determining factor. Distances will be measured according to the Ordnance Survey eastings and northings for the child's home address and the school. Those living closer to the school will be given priority.

If 2 or more children with the same priority for admission live in an indistinguishable distance from the preferred school, but cannot all be admitted, then the available places will be decided by means of casting lots (random application).
